
Our Vision


For 2023 our regular attendance was at 87.5%. This number has been stable over the past three years. We are still above like schools and are aligned to WA schools for regular attendance.

SCHOOL LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

Pastoral Care

We pride ourselves on a whole-school approach for acknowledging and supporting students, staff and community members through our Pastoral Care initiatives. Well-embedded into our school community are our Five Virtues - Caring, Respect, Courage, Courtesy and Integrity which are taught and reinforced at all opportunities.

Kristi Crognale, our school chaplain, supported a number of our students and their families throughout the year offering them support and general assistance. Kristi has built strong ties with local organisations and groups who support our school in many ways. This culminated in our inaugural 'Whole School Lunch' where local members of the Harvey community donated time and food to prepare a lunch for all students from Kindergarten to Year 6 as well as the staff. It was an amazing way to finish the school year that was truly appreciated by the school community.

We continue to use Highway Heroes as our social/emotional program. Highway Heroes uses the metaphor of the highway to describe the journey everyone takes through life, with primary school being one of the first destinations. Along the highway there are times where we need to slow down, which is defined as a bump, and times where we need to stop, perhaps even get some help, known as a hazard. Defining events in life's journey in this way has helped our students. We will be reviewing the program in 2024 to decide if it still having the desired effect supporting our students with their emotional needs

Behaviour Management

Student behaviour at Harvey PS is supported by our whole school behaviour strategies that include our minor and major referrals while at the same time focusing on our positives that include class and whole school rewards as well as our student Good Standing policy. These provide clear guidelines for students, promote personal responsibility and provide a framework for all staff when counselling students regarding their behaviour. We continue to create school wide positive behaviours incentives.

STUDENT PERFORMANCE

NAPZAN 2023 Comparative Performance

2023 comparative performance calculations are based on Index of Socio-Educational Advantage (ICSEA) only. Calculations are based on WA public school students, excluding students identified with an intellectual disability.

Due to the new scale, comparisons between 2023 and previous years are not made.
2023 has been displayed separately from previous years. Comparative calculations were not made in 2022.

Our comparative performance against like schools indicate that we are achieving what is expected of our students in the majority of assessments. In 2023 Year 3 Writing was well below expected however Year 5 Reading and Writing were well above the expected level.

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SCHOOL REVIEW

In August 2023 the school undertook the Education Department's Public School Review (PSR). The report identified many strengths and areas of commendations. as well as recommendations. To see the comprehensive list of commendations and recommendations refer to the full report on the school's website or Schools Online. The school received a year return in the areas of Quality Teaching and Leadership based on recomendations. These two areas were also identified by staff as requiring improvement.

Some particular areas of note are;

- -High levels of parent and community satisfaction with the school.
- -Positive and productive relationships with the School Board and P&C.
- -Regular and valid feedback is sought and received from parents and staff.
- -The learning environment is enhanced by the way student behaviour is managed. It aligns to the Focus Five virtues.
- Strategies are established to support students at risk.
- -A clear approach to performance management and development is evident.
- -Sound financial management is evident across the school.
- -A high priority is placed on collaborative planning to embed consistency in writing across the school.
- -The school uses a range of systemic, standardised and school based assessment to inform teaching and learning.

Recommendations included;

- -Prioritise the implementation of an agreed whole school consistent approach to numeracy.
- -Develop and implement a whole school instructional model for consistent lesson design.
- -Continue to strengthen well-being approaches for staff and students.
- -Ensure whole school structures and priorities are clearly aligned to the business plan, operational and classroom planning.
